STUDEBAKER HISTORY

One Stop Shopping in Benson in 1918 By Bob Miles

The early days of Benson, Arizona, the town as a stop for the railroad for the Sunset Limited, the flagship of the Southern Pacific. The depot, which was built in 1880, still stands as a stop for Amtrak and Greyhound, as well as the Benson Historical Society. It stands across from the Horseshoe Cafe, where people waiting for the train can have a cup of coffee.

If you lived in Benson in 1918 and needed a prescription, you would see Charley Moss. Since 1918, to keep your food fresh, you would either shop every day at the Hi Wo grocery store (the building is still standing) or the Max Treu Meat Company. If you picked up an ice box from the meat company, Charley Moss had the ice plant to supply ice for your ice box.

If you wanted a soft drink, SB (Sterling) Moss, Charley's brother, had a soft drink bottling plant and the Studebaker Garage in 1918. At the time, World War I was on-going, and the United States entered the war in 1917. Sterling was able to secure Studebaker cars as other car dealerships were not interested because of the small size of the town.

As cars then became hard to come by, in 1919 it was decided by Sterling to broker a car and the buyer would ride the train to Tucson then drive the car back. It was a Ford car, but the trip would take three hours to drive back over the roads back then.

The buildings for the Studebaker dealership still stand on 4th Avenue as most of the buildings mentioned. The building is now a Karate Studio and southeast of the train depot.

So, if anyone wants to take a tour, let me know.



S. B. (Sterling) Moss got into the automobile business early, selling and servicing Studebakers in

Studebaker Prototypes, Bob Temple & OMNT

My Studebaker story began in 1951 when my family was able to purchase a 1950 4-door Champion six-cylinder w/3 on the tree & overdrive (an essential option). But wait - there is more to come - the icing on the cake - the car was painted Black Cherry which would become my favorite Studebaker color. Fast forward to 1967 when I got married and discovered that my new wife LOVED old cars! I looked for a Studebaker club for years but did not find one until meeting Bruce Sandberg at work and he introduced me to Chuck Naugle who invited Bruce, me, Marion Haswell & Arlyn Ballinger to form a local Tucson Chapter of SDC. After plunking down our life savings, we became Lifetime Member #36. And so it begins.

There are lots of rumors circulating about Studebaker Prototypes and one I heard involved a 1950's cabover truck. Having seen pictures of the beautiful 1930's Studebaker Cab-Over Engine's (COE), I was excited to be on the hunt for a 1950's COE. As I had time, I talked with Studebaker enthusiasts and ran ads in Turning Wheels soliciting information on this elusive truck. My first break came in 1987 when Jim Maxey wrote (remember letters) me with a lead. Jim had been to see John Nemeth, a former Studebaker employee from the early 20's and had seen pictures of the prototype. I contacted John and he referred me to Jim Kyle and then to Bob Aker. After exhausting those leads, I went back to John, who remembered that Bob McDonald had a lot of work pictures and he lived in Ardmore, Indiana, but he had been 75 years old in the early 70's. John had heard that Bob had sold all his Studebaker stuff, but no one remembers to whom. John told me some of the South Bend Club members had friends who worked at Bendix Proving Grounds (formerly Studebaker Proving Grounds) and he snuck several Studebaker people into the boneyard on two occasions. Through this connection, the 1946-47 Studebaker Woody Wagon was found. So, the story goes Max Corkins became interested and coordinated the removal of the Prototype. Unfortunately, the metal was rusted badly, and the wood parts crumbled on touch so the car had to be braced with wooden framework for transport. Mr. Nemeth told me that Max realized that the car was too far gone to restore and tried to sell it. Then the Studebaker Museum became interested and now the car is a reality. The Tucson connection to this story is that Chuck Naugle donated and delivered a structurally sound 1947 4-door sedan for the project.

The Studebaker visitors to the Bendix Proving Grounds must have realized that many of the vehicles were significant and some might be salvageable, so they picked up some of the bodies and placed them on horizontal tree trunks. Most of the prototype projects that were sent to the boneyard were removed from the frames. The boneyard was similar to a swamp and filled with snakes (my favorite).

Another interesting prototype wagon in the boneyard was a 1947 2-door coupe with a plastic/fiberglass roof. I don't know if that car was rescued, but I have seen the roof in a residential area in South Bend (a benefit of driving up and down alley's in South Bend).

The R-series cabover was in the boneyard and in surprisingly good condition. Most of the boneyard prototypes had damaged roofs and broken glass due to the Elm trees dying and falling. The cabover was picked up and placed on some fallen trees to keep it out of the mud and water. At that time it had no grill, steering wheel, seats, dashboard, pedals, frame, axle's or wheels. For some reason the project of retrieving the COE went to the back burner. Some Bendix employee's became interested in the truck and put it on a frame. Along came management and ordered the employee's to scrap the project or be fired! According to this rumor the COE prototype was crushed, possibly at Hurich Iron in South Bend.

After tracking down many leads and a few trips to South Bend, I met Bob Temple thru the mail. I had heard about Bob Temple for several years and was always interested in getting to meet him. Bob Temple's history includes:

He was born in Alaska in 1914.

By 1939, he was working in the GM truck studio as a \$75 per month apprentice where he turned out detailed airbrush and watercolor drawings and clay models for trucks.

He went to Ford and designed their 1953-56 pickup.

His title at Studebaker was Manager, Styling Studio Studebaker Trucks.

Bob was not a person to sit behind a desk and became involved in many projects at Studebaker offering his help where he could.

In searching for this R series truck, I found Bill Bauman who built a 1965 Champ truck. After reorganizing my bookroom and putting all my Turning Wheels in binders, labeling them and making them easily accessible. I found the February 1987 Turning Wheels with Bill's '65 Champ on page 15. What a good-looking truck!

Back to the COE story. One day in 1955 Gene Hardig suggested to Bob Temple that they go downtown and look at the new FC Jeep Cabover. They liked what they saw, and Bob was told to build one. There were no drawings or pictures. As Bob said (it was strictly a shop cobb job). On the first test drive, Bob discovered that the steering was so weird that he could barely keep the truck between the telephone poles that lined the alley (all new projects etc. were test driven in the alleyways for secrecy). Then back in the shop, Bob moved the front spring shackles to the rear (similar to the 8E pickups) and the steering improved. The truck was a modified C-cab on a 1/2-ton frame. It was complete except for a grille, so Bob made a clay mold for a flat nose with heavy molding and a screen insert like on trailer toters. Bob believes that this grille was run thru a saw after the project was scrapped because he never saw it again. Bob was planning to draw a picture of the grille from memory for me and to pass on to me some of his materials, but one thing led to another and he passed away in 1991. Bob said it was not an attempt to go to COE but rather to gain a different style to compete.

Around 1989, Bob was building a Pierce-Arrow Excalibur sports car with a Lark grille and a set back engine. In his spare time Bob was building a 1955 Packard Clipper hot rod. At 75 years of age, Bob said that he outlived Mitchell, Engle and all the rest of The Studebaker Boys because he kept busy.

Over a period of time I have heard 2-3 South Bend residents say that the R-series COE was crushed at Edwards Iron, not Hurich. So now we have three opinions regarding the demise of the COE project.

Another side project of Bob's was a three passenger Hawk-Thunderbird type car that he built before Ford did and tried to interest Studebaker in building it, but without luck. Bob had a box of numerous pictures, drawings, cost analysis and other items from his time at Studebaker and was going to send them to me, but he passed away. In 1991 Bob's stuff was auctioned off, but none of his things have turned up. I used to have a styling study color picture (courtesy of Dick Quinn) of a Studebaker truck that Bob did in 1956, it was beautiful. John Nemeth spoke to me about another prototype, the 1953 Studebaker convertible that Bob Temple helped to design. The convertible was built in late 1952 on a 1953 hardtop as a Engineering Study and later modified to 1954 specifications and driven around South Bend by engineers. For safety reasons all automobile companies are supposed to destroy or ensure that prototypes never end up in the hands of the public but somehow a Studebaker employee named Dale Dratcher convinced management to sell him the 1953 convertible around 1958 for about \$90 without a title and under the condition that it never be sold. Dale's daughter drove the car to Purdue University for four years and then for some unknown reason it was parked behind a Toyota dealership for several years. It was then taken to a South Bend gas station for repairs where it sat for years. Eventually the gas station was abandoned and surrounded with security fence. According to John, Mr. Dratcher moved the car to a barn to hide it and refused to comment on the car to anyone. In a story for the November 1982 issue of Car Exchange, Bob provided extensive background material on the 1953 Studebaker Commander Convertible, three nice black and white photos and the beautiful cutaway picture. I have a copy of the cutaway design if anyone wants to see it.

John Nemeth who was in charge of The Restoration Fund at The Studebaker Museum said that a future project would be The Astra, built by Studebaker in 1957-58 for an Automobile Show, made of fiberglass and designed to run on the ION Beam, and never materialized. The ION Beam was projected for the year 2000 and Studebaker spent \$150,000 on the Astra.

I started writing this article in 1975-then it went to the back burner while I gathered info and then in 1989 I wrote more and finally in 1991 I finished it. June Kaiser helped turn my poor handwritten notes into a type written article. Then I misplaced 20 pages of notes only to find everything this year (2023). It was interesting to read June's interpretation of my scribbling! Thanks to June & Jerry for all you have done for me and SAC-SDC.

Oh, and yes — OMNT from the title comes from Nora, my wife, and means Old Man Nonsense Talk.


